

Dudley Pond: Some Facts

- · 84 acres
- Maximum depth of about 30 feet
- Owned by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts
 - · "Great Pond" designation (ensures public recreational access)
 - Leased to Town of Wayland in 1916 for 99 years





Dudley Pond: Some History

- 1882-1883: Mansion Inn (aka Simpson Estate) first major establishment built
 - Destroyed by fire in 1956
- 1900-1918: Boom in summer homes built by people from Boston and environs
- 1930s: Great Depression and Prohibition brought major changes
 - Bootlegging gangsters; brothels; speakeasies
 - Summer homes became year round residences
 - · Inadequate septage systems and some houses literally hung over the shoreline
- Post Depression: Return to "normalcy", but septic
 & other problems remained
 - . Annual Winter Carnival
 - Heavy recreational usage



Dudley Pond: More History

- 1950s: Ecomonic conditions prompted urban renewal activities
 - · Unhealthy pond conditions (paratyphoid)
 - Town applied for Urban Renewal funds based on more than 50% of homes "unfit for human habitation"
 - Strong local resistance forced scale-down of renewal activities & return of grant monies
- Ongoing: Some positive change in pond conditions
 - Improvements made by residents served to improve Dudley Pond water quality, but . . .
 - Poor road drainage found to be major source of nutrients and pollution into the pond



What is the DPA?

- Membership-based organization covering the entire Dudley Pond watershed
 - · Includes residents abutting parcel under consideration by DAAC
- Tax-exempt organization under Section 501 (c) (3) of the IRS code
- Governance and management assigned to an Executive Board
 - Officers + Standing Committee chairpeople
 - Approve all decisions with due diligence to incorporate views and opinions of membership
 - Membership must approve expenditures above \$1500
 - Conducts two scheduled membership meetings/year (Fall and Spring) and ad-hoc meetings as necessary



DPA Purposes

- Educate public on preservation of Dudley Pond and surrounding watershed
- Work with government agencies & reps,
 community agencies & other pond associations
 - Create, fund, implement programs that help preserve health of Dudley Pond & the watershed
- Monitor water quantity & quality, weed populations & other pond health indicators
 - · Use results to improve health of Dudley Pond
- Create & nurture community spirit among Dudley Pond residents; encourage activities among members, residents, & community at large



Dudley Pond's Major Issue: WEEDS!









DPA Weed Management: Many Things Have Been Tried

2002: Dudley Pond Weed Committee

- Explored 18 options for dealing with what had grown to be unmanageable with current methods (hand pulling)
- Top recommendations called for herbicide treatments
- · Some other options not studied due to lack of pilot data or state approval

2003: Sonar treatment was performed

- · Previous treatments in 1992, 1996, & 1997.
- · Effective, but only lasts a few years
- · Needs to be combined with hand pulling and spot treatments

2003: Draw down feasibility study

 Detailed issues of need for favorable weather conditions, methods of water disposal, water replenishment options and financial considerations

· 2005: DPA received federal S.319 Grant

- 40% matched by Town of Wayland and DPA
- Nonpoint Source Pollution Grant Program
- Included use of milfoil weevils in 2006; results were not promising





- ... Even More Things Have Been Tried
 - · 2006: More hand pulling (140K plants removed)
 - 2007: Earmark grant from State Department of Conservation
 - · Funded mechanical harvesting in summer
 - Purchase of 3 water circulators to distribute O2 through water column, increase oxidation rate of ammonia reducing its availability to milfoil (evaluation ongoing)
 - 2008: SWQC received approval from ConCom for multi-year treatment (3-5 years)
 - Herbicide treatment, plant monitoring and more aggressive hand pulling over time
 - · DPA provided some funds and volunteer time
 - 2009-2010: Follow up hand pulling and spot treatment (Triclopyr)



DPA Board Position re: "Best Uses"

- DPA Board sees consideration of "best uses" as an opportunity to achieve significant improvements to Dudley Pond health
- <u>IF</u> parcel is to be used for one or a combination of uses incorporated into DAAC's charter, those uses should focus primarily on optimizing positive effects on Dudley Pond health
 - Concentrate on storm/ground water and septic improvements
- Preservation as wooded preserve and/or neighborhood trails seen as positive to the degree that they don't interfere with focus on pond health
- Adding additional housing is seen to work against optimizing pond health improvements in already overcrowded area
 - · Additional housing <u>should not</u> be considered unless it is shown that it will have zero effect on an optimized pond health improvement plan



DPA Board Position: Caveats

- Position is of the DPA Board <u>only</u> not the membership
 - · Watershed residents may exhibit diverse opinions
- DPA Board will provide DAAC committee with position on specific proposals as they are formulated
- · Fall DPA meeting will take place on November 6th
 - DAAC update will be presented to membership
 - DPA representative to DAAC will report back on any changes to the position



The Bottom Line ...

- Dudley Pond has significant, ongoing weed problems tied to:
 - Invasive weeds
 - · Sources of nutrients that feed them
- DPA's charter is to protect and improve pond health which is negatively impacted by weeds
- DPA Board encourages DAAC to see "best use" as opportunity to focus on the most positive impact on pond health possible
- DPA Board believes additional housing in an overcrowded area is inconsistent with this view
